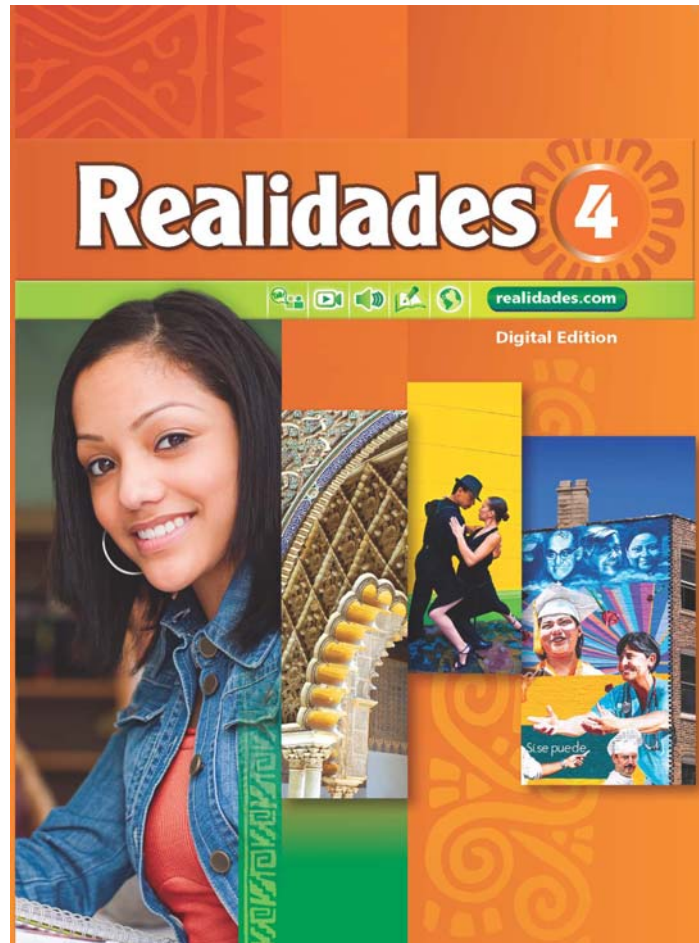

Level IV	
Level IV modern languages content standards require students to master complex features of the language and to comprehend more abstract concepts. Students are introduced to a wide variety of texts that employ a greater variety of language as well as cultural references and figures of speech. They are able to understand materials presented on a variety of topics related to contemporary events and issues in the target cultures. Upon completion of Level IV, a student's proficiency level may range from Intermediate Mid to Intermediate High.
